Homelessness is up 23% from 2023



The Facts:

- <u>Extreme heat and cold weather events are increasing</u>: We need to help stabilize people who are in crisis now. The 2024 Point in Time Count demonstrates there are **2,661 people** homeless in Pierce County while only **1,726 shelter beds** are available.
- <u>Without MORE temporary shelter, people will die in the elements:</u> During an **18-month period** between 2022 2023, <u>**158**</u> homeless Pierce County residents died. Temporary shelters save lives.
- <u>Both temporary housing AND permanently affordable housing are needed and we MUST do both:</u> Thanks to the passage of the 2023 Maureen Howard Affordable Housing Act, we now have ~\$20M/year for affordable housing. <u>While more units are built, we need temporary, crisis solutions</u>.
- <u>County Republicans are stoking fears of "tent cities:"</u> Sanctioned Temporary Housing Communities will be clean, orderly, and regulated and will include access to supportive services necessary to transition homeless folks to permanent housing. They will also require a County permit for construction. **These are <u>NOT</u> tent cities**.
- <u>This should be a bipartisan issue:</u> This Council made homelessness reduction a priority. It's reflected in our 2024-2025 budget, which was unanimously approved by this Council, and signed by the Executive.
- <u>Managed Tiny Home Communities (THCs) reduce unsanctioned encampments:</u> We can move people from unsheltered living into temporary housing with supportive services to something more permanent quickly and more efficiently.

 Based on estimates from his own Human Services Department and the 2024 Point in Time Count, <u>the</u> <u>County is currently short</u> <u>almost 1,000 shelter units</u> to meet the needs of those in crisis.
