From Tacoma Rescue Mission's Duke Paulson: Hello!

I want to give you a brief update about the Good Neighbor Village project. This is in part to respond to misleading allegations made by the Spanaway Concerned Citizens group

that opposes the project. TRM is accused by the group of willful un-permitted actions and significantly impacting the wetland areas near the Good Neighbor Village. They argue that construction should halt Here is what happened. As the rainy season approaches, Tacoma Rescue Mission recently took steps to address accessibility via the county road to the rental home and buildings on the property. TRM had the culverts (pipes that go under the road) cleared of debris so water would flow freely underneath and not over the road during continuous rain. We also replaced a failed overflow culvert and added gravel to the roadway to level and fill potholes, and in one case widened the road to more closely match the two-lane width of the road connecting to it. TRM also added gravel to a deteriorated dirt road for vehicle access to a barn and a turnaround located on the property. In one location, the added gravel encroached 8-10 feet into a wetland buffer area. We now know that these actions should have been discussed and. in several cases, permitted separately from our current project permit process prior to doing this work. These oversights occurred due to an internal communication error between different teams, and we have since taken firm steps to ensure that this mistake will not happen again.

After disclosing what happened to the regulating agencies and viewing the area with the Department of Fish and Wildlife, a wetland biologist, the county staff, and TRM contracted engineers and project team, TRM was told that this work should have been specifically permitted, and because it was not, we would receive formal notice letters from the county for each violation as well as a request to submit plans to repair any damage. On a positive note, what was done is generally allowable activity (when permitted) and has not significantly damaged the wetland areas or wildlife. TRM has agreed to do remediation (corrective actions) to repair damage done, as well as to apply for and retroactively receive the permits needed for the performed work. This will effectively correct the situation, which is what we all want to happen.

Additional good news is that the wetland impact was performed on a road that was not a part of the Good Neighbor Village project area. We've been informed that this should have no impact on the viability of the Good Neighbor Village permitting and construction proceeding as planned. We are very excited to continue developing this new community that gives real hope and a new life to our chronically unhoused neighbors in Pierce County.

At the Tacoma Rescue Mission, we are committed to learning from this experience and ensuring that we uphold the highest standards of responsibility — both to our community and the environment. We sincerely apologize for any concern this may have caused, and we are working diligently to correct it. If you have any further questions or feedback, we welcome the opportunity for dialogue as we move forward.

The HSC Process and Eligibility

- HSC offers services to Kitsap County residents who are homeless or at risk
 of becoming homeless. The eligibility for specific programs such as
 emergency shelters and rental assistance will depend on the specific
 qualifications of each agency. Your KCR Navigator will review your personal
 situation and connect you with the resources for which you are qualified.
- Individuals and families are encouraged to visit their nearest HSC location.
 Many convenient sites are located in Kitsap County, including centers in Bremerton, North Kitsap, Bainbridge Island, South Kitsap. Coffee Oasis locations are open exclusively for teens and young adults ages 13-25.
- All households will complete a brief intake application followed by an appointment with a KCR Navigator to review available housing options.
- All clients are able to be seen on a walk-in basis at the Bremerton location.(1201 Park Ave, Bremerton)

ABOUT US

Kitsap Recovery Center (KRC), located in Port Orchard, provides both inpatient and outpatient substance abuse treatment services.

KRC is state-approved and utilizes the American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) treatment criteria.

The facility houses 27 inpatient treatment beds and 9 sub-acute detoxification beds. Employees include treatment staff, administrative support staff and two private consultants contracted to provide medical and dietary advice and assistance.

Annually, approximately 1,200 adult men and women receive chemical dependency treatment for drug and/or alcohol addiction.

KRC serves primarily low-income and Medicaid-eligible clients. KRC provides information, education and referrals to all county residents.

SERVICES INCLUDE...

- Inpatient treatment program (up to 60 days)
- Sub-acute detoxification services (varied length of stay)
- DSHS assessments and referrals (state-sponsored treatment)
- Case management services
- Drug Court outpatient chemical dependency treatment
- Programs for family members of in-patient clients
- Information and referrals

FUNDING

Washington State Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS) directly

funds intensive inpatient treatment. A separate contract with DSHS provides funding for most other Recovery Center services administered by the Human Services Division. Drug Court services are funded through a federal grant. The County contributes funds from real estate excise tax revenues to offset mortgage and other facility expenses.

It's a free online tool where parents, caregivers, and providers can securely store, share, and track children's developmental screening information from birth through age 5.

By creating a centralized and secure location for sharing developmental information, Strong Start offers families and health care providers the opportunity to collaborate to best support each child's unique development and make sure they find any needed support. Regular screenings show how children are doing with language, movement, thinking, and interacting with others. It's important because the brain develops faster between birth and age 5 than any other stage.

"Universal developmental screenings play a critical role in ensuring all children have the best possible chance at a healthy future by monitoring important milestones in their speech, play, and motor skills," said Michele Roberts, Assistant Secretary for Prevention and Community Health, DOH. "Strong Start empowers parents and caregivers to take direct action in their child's health while also ensuring they can find the necessary resources for their children to thrive."

Parents and caregivers can add Strong Start as a service to their <u>Secure Access</u> <u>Washington</u> accounts. From there, they can easily enter their child's completed developmental screening results and share them with authorized health care providers of their choosing. Parents and caregivers can also use links to find screening tools within Strong Start if a child has not completed a developmental screening with their health care provider.
